

The Battlefields Visit by Sam B

Our trip to Belgium was honestly the trip of a lifetime - four days completely packed with activities, experiences, and memories that I'll never forget. There were so many highlights, but visiting the battlefields and memorials really stood out.

Walking around places like Newfoundland Park and the Thiepval Memorial, a sense of reality suddenly hit me. Standing among the rows of graves of soldiers who had given their lives for their country was incredibly moving. The graves were scattered across the park, each one representing a real person with a real story. Reading some of their names and ages made it all feel very personal, and it was impossible not to feel a deep sense of respect.

A visit that really stood out for me was Sanctuary Wood. Walking through the preserved trenches felt almost unreal. We could see how cramped, muddy, and chaotic life must have been for the soldiers. It wasn't like the neat reconstructions you sometimes see - these trenches were uneven, narrow, and still full of the original twists and turns. Standing there, imagining what the soldiers experienced, made everything we'd learned so far even more powerful. A military wives choir sang "Bring him home" from Les Misérables. You could hear a pin drop. A truly magical moment.

BEBRAS challenge participants

Computing students across John Flamsteed have recently excelled in the annual **Bebras Challenge** organised by the Raspberry Pi Foundation. This online challenge takes place worldwide with a series of interactive tasks, designed to encourage logical thinking and problem-solving skills. In addition to students achieving Merit and Distinction awards, those with the highest scores in their age groups have earned the prestigious Best in School awards.

We are also proud of the commitment shown by so many of our students tackling this for the first time, especially to have 13 students achieve the Gold Award, given only to the top 10% of participants nationally, an extra well done to:

Adam, Rose, Oscar and Jesse (Juniors, 10-12), Isabelle, Albert, Hannah, George, Theo, Eleanor, Riley and Oliver (Intermediates, 12-14) and CJ (Seniors, 14-16). These exceptional achievers are invited to take part in the next round, the Coding Challenge, in March 2026.





Geography Field Trip

Mr Wood and his team are extremely proud of the students for their behaviour, enthusiasm, and hard work throughout the recent GCSE Geography residential fieldtrip to the Field Studies Council Centre at Preston Montford. The visit formed an enrichment part of the Eduqas B fieldwork investigation, focusing on qualitative surveys, geographical cycles and flows, and it proved to be an extremely successful and enjoyable experience for all students involved. On the human geography afternoon, students carried out an investigation into the perception of need for regeneration in the town of Shrewsbury, conducting surveys, observations, and qualitative assessments to reflect on how and why regeneration priorities vary across urban environments. On the physical geography day, students explored the stunning Carding Mill Valley, where they investigated the changing characteristics of a river along its course, measuring velocity, channel width, depth, gradient, and sediment size. Extra recognition must go to one of our students who managed the whole walk on crutches having torn ligaments the day before the trip! A truly dedicated Geographer! Beyond the academic activities, students participated fully in a team-building assault course and orienteering challenge. Staff were impressed by the students' energy, cooperation, and support for one another. Mr Wood is looking forward to the next local fieldwork visit in February, where students will investigate another geographical issue to further strengthen their fieldwork experience ahead of the exam.

Inspiration Day

Year 8 students had an incredible day exploring the wonders of science at Magna Science Adventure Centre in Sheffield. They explored the four pavilions (Earth, Water, Air and Fire) and saw some really great science experiments in the workshop. Our students were an absolute credit to our school community- their enthusiasm, behaviour and engagement were nothing short of remarkable.

Year 7 enjoyed an inspiring visit from Oliver at The Art of Brilliance, who encouraged students to embrace resilience and "be their brilliant best." using only marshmallows and straws to create the tallest possible afternoon, Derbyshire school nurses delivered an engaging health and their form groups and get to know their new students better!





Year 9 were visited by the Rolls-Royce apprenticeship team and their current apprentices for LEGO programming through coding, virtual welding where students and staff donned headsets and tools to compete for the perfect weld and many more group projects. Throughout the day, students explored the wide range of apprenticeships and career pathways Rolls-Royce offers, asking thoughtful questions to the visiting apprentices. They even took on a STEM boatbuilding challenge using only recycled materials, applying principles of buoyancy and motion to create a floating, moving sailboat!







Year 10 took part in a fascinating Criminal Justice Day exploring religion, British values and careers within the justice system. Students investigated a religion-based crime scenario, gathering evidence and learning how the police approach real cases. They conducted forensic testing on urine, clothing, hair, blood and ink samples before heading to "court" to deliver their final verdict. Students also heard from SCI forensic scientist, who spoke about her career solving crime!



Year 11 had an action-packed and purposeful day. 27 local businesses held mock interviews, giving students a real taste of what a professional interview feels like. Derbyshire police and the RAF talked of their experiences and set the students challenges such as a reaction-time test to see who might make it into the top 7% of future pilots! Derby College presented information on post-16 pathways and students reviewed their personal statements and mapped out their revision.
